VITAL NEW YORK is a free online library of digital media resources for the K-12 classroom presented by Thirteen/WNET. Featuring dynamic public television video and interactive content, this growing collection has over 31,000 registered New York users and is fully aligned to the NY State Learning Standards. VITAL NY brings the world into the classroom by providing real-life applications of concepts that engage students and stimulate discussion and learning. VITAL is made possible through a grant from the U.S. Dept. of Education's Ready to Teach program.

In September 2008 VITAL NY re-launched with a dramatically expanded collection of more than 3,700 resources for teachers and students. This includes 475 resources developed to support the New York State core curriculum in English Language Arts and mathematics for grades 3-8, as well as 2,000+ resources that have been aligned to the New York State Regents curriculum in Global History and Geography, US History, Living Environment, Earth and Space Science, Physics, and Chemistry. VITAL NY is being made available through a strategic collaboration between Thirteen/WNET and WGBH/Boston's Teachers' Domain service.

How to Use Folder and Groups

Go to http://vital.thirteen.org and sign in.

To create a folder:

- 1. Click on My folders > Manage My Folders.
- 2. Click on Create a New Folder.
- 3. Give a title to your folder and add a description if you want. Click on Create New Folder.
- 4. Uncheck if you do not want this folder displayed on your drop down "My folders" menu.

To create a group:

- 1. Click on My groups.
- 2. Click on Create a New Group.
- 3. Give a title to your group and, if you want, add a description.
- 4. Uncheck "Allow all access requests" if you want to limit who can access this group. If you do, you can easily add or remove users from your group by checking a box next to their names.
- 5. Click on Create New Group.
- 6. Add/Remove folders to this group.

To join a group:

- 1. Click on My groups.
- 2. Scroll down the page until you see the link Join a Group and click on it.
- 3. Enter the group ID number and click Join Group.
- 4. Uncheck if you do not want this folder displayed on your drop down "My folders" menu. (**Group folders** are displayed under the **My Folder** menu, too.)

To update your profile:

- 1. Click on My Profile.
- 2. Make necessary changes and click <u>update</u>.
